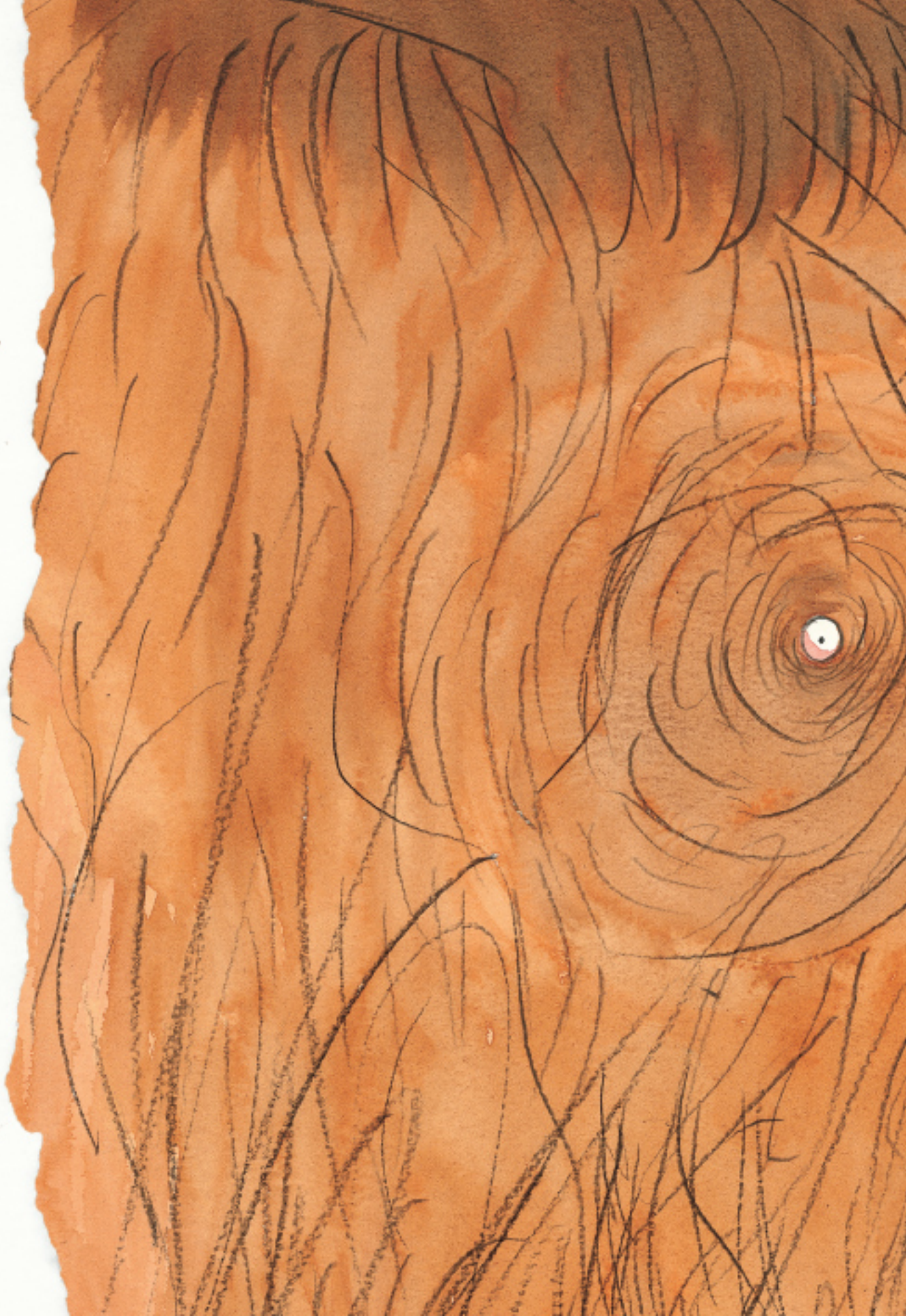

The woolly mammoth was a type of mammoth that lived in Britain, Europe and Asia, as well as North America during the last Ice Age.



It had shaggy fur and a thick layer of fat to keep it warm. Its tusks were up to three metres long and a male could weigh six tons.

Led by an experienced female, a mammoth herd may have migrated between feeding grounds just like African elephants and reindeer still do today.

The tip of a mammoth's trunk worked like a finger and thumb, passing food to its mouth.
