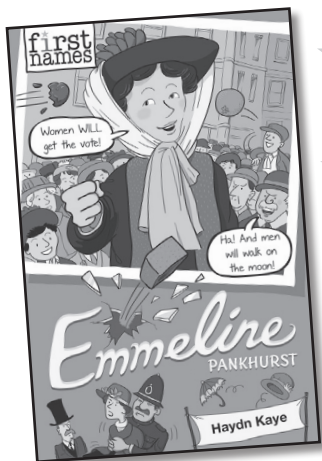

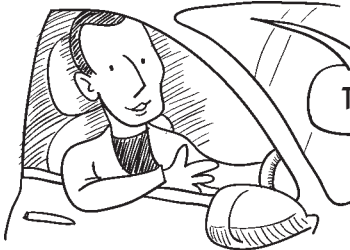
But before we follow Elon’s rockets into orbit, let’s find out a bit more about him.

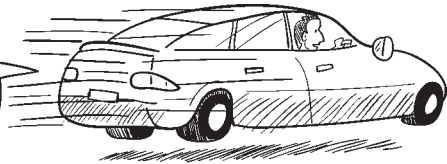

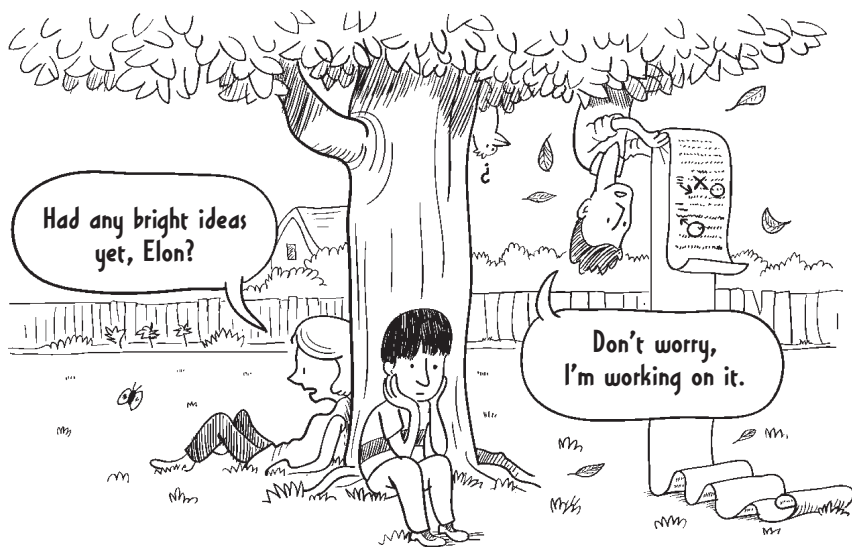
# 1    **Elon's Easter Eggs and Blasting Stars**

You might want to take a moment to get your head around the full horror of this next bit, because – even though they could easily have afforded it – **Mr and Mrs Musk didn't give their children any**

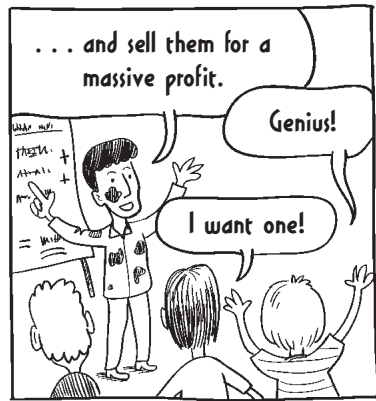
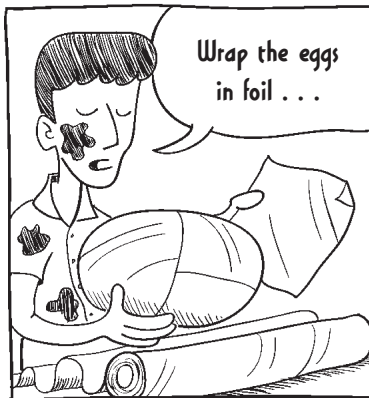
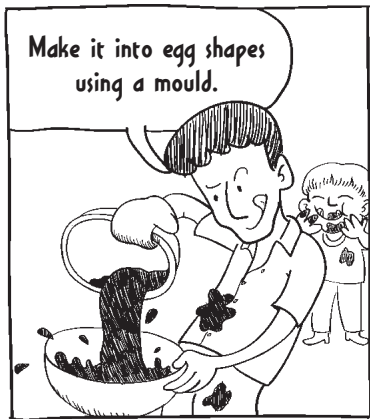

The cousins took their Easter eggs around the wealthiest streets in Pretoria, and used a clever sales pitch to sell them for about ten times the going rate.



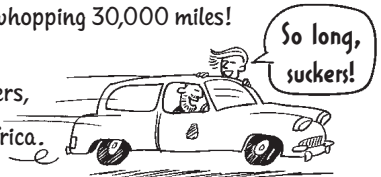
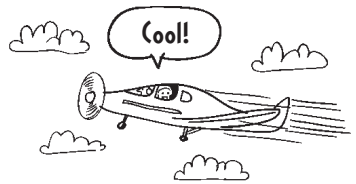
It worked! The cousins made a tidy sum.
